
## Alfred Dixon

Alfred was the first born of Elizabeth and John Dixon. He was born about 1835 at Hunslet, Leeds. He was at home for the 1841 and 1851 census nights but before the next census he had married. From a FreeBMD registration it would appear that Alfred married, in the Apr-Jun quarter of 1859, at Leeds, Elizabeth Grayson. This assumption has been borne out by the marriage certificate. On 23rd June 1859, when he was 25, Alfred married 22 year old Elizabeth Grayson at the Parish Church of Leeds, following the calling of banns. At the time of his marriage Alfred was living at West Hillary Street, and was earning his living as a wool stapler. Elizabeth was residing at Beeston Road. The respective fathers were John Dixon, Wool Stapler and William Grayson, Bookkeeper. As seen from the 1851 census return below, the witnesses to the marriage, William and Isabella Ann Grayson, were brother and sister to Elizabeth.



Elizabeth was the daughter of William and Sarah Grayson, born about 1838 in Leeds. The 1841 census has this family at Ansley Street, Hunslet, as follows.

For the 1851 census this family has increased and was now living at Princess Place, Hunslet.

There has been no record found for in the 1861 census for Alfred and Elizabeth. Perhaps the record was lost. However, they reappear in the 1871 census, living at 2 Mount Pleasant Road, Longwood, a parish of Golcar, near Huddersfield, and an important woollen manufacturing centre.

As the latest additions to the family were born in Longwood, the family would have moved there sometime between 1865 and 1868. At some stage after 1871, and probably just before the birth of their last child, Alfred in 1879, the family moved back to Leeds where they are found for the 1881 census, living at 55 Meanwood Road, North West Ward, with three additional children.

Note, for the 1881 census all children are recorded as being born in Leeds. Note also, however that the Civil Registration 1837-1983 records the births of Ellen, Edgar and Hampden as registered in Huddersfield

Two of the older children are now in work, and Frederick seems destined to follow in the family's traditional connection to the wool trade.


There is no record in the 1891 Census of this family - again perhaps the records have not survived or have been mistranscribed, or they were not in the country on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> April. However, they seem to have been located in the 1901 census now living in a semi-detached villa at 2 Slade Hill, Wigton, Wetherby. Wigton was a small township six miles north of Leeds. Alfred is now retired and all the children have left home. With Alfred and his wife however are 2 young girls, described as their granddaughters. It may also be significant that the Ancestry cover sheet for the 1901 census return also refers to the little girls as step daughters.

From the birth certificate of Nancy Dawson, she (and presumably Eva) were the daughters of Clara (formerly Dixon) and Frank Dawson. At this stage no record of any of the other Dixon children has been found either in the 1891 and 1901 census returns.



## Clara Dawson



Clara was the third known child, and second daughter, of Alfred and Elizabeth Dixon. Born about 1864, as noted above she was at home for the 1871 and 1881 census returns. However for the 1891 census she was not listed at home with her parents. She would have been about 26 years old. We know from the birth certificate of Nancy Dawson that her father, and Clara's husband, was Frank Dawson, Cotton Dyer Foreman, and that on the date of Nancy's birth, 21st July 1897, they were living at 71 Dover Street, Crumpsall, North Manchester.

At this stage I have not been able to locate any marriage record for Clara or Frank, and therefore have not been able to trace Frank's provenance. Nor have I located any census record for the couple in the 1891 census (or for Clara as a single woman still named Dixon). It is possible that one or both parents had died by the 1901 census judging by the alternative listing of Nancy and Eva as step-granddaughters. I have located an 1891 census return for a Frank Dawson, born about 1864 at Linthwaite in the Huddersfield district, son of Sam and Sarah Dawson, and working as a Cotton Dyer. A further census return for 1901 under the names

Frank and Clara Dowson has been located (with Frank's place of birth listed as Huddersfield and Clara's as Leeds), and with Frank listed as a Cotton Dyer, which looks promising. But anything further is a mystery.
